DURATION

OBJECTIVE

TSW conduct a short research project. TSW integrate information from several texts to report on a topic. TSW report on a topic using facts and

LESSON SEQUENCE

Introduction

- TTW begin by showing the students different pictures of stamps.
 - TTW ask the students if they know what the purpose of a stamp is and the students will volunteer answers.
 - TT and the student will analyze the different components of the stamps (ex. What/who is featured on them, shape and size, the prize of the stamp, etc.)
- TTW tell the student that there are certain artists who work as stamp designers.
 - TSW watch the video about stamp designing found at https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=eKh3lq6SV84
- TT and the student will discuss the part of the video where the speaker states that each stamp tells a story.
- TTW ask the student how they think they can use stamps to tell a story or give information.
 - TSW volunteer responses to this question.
- TTW explain to the student that, when creating a stamp, a designer must also do research to tell the story of who/what is being portrayed by the stamp.

Transition

- TTW tell the student that they will be stamp designers creating a stamp for one of the fifty states of America.
 - TSW draw a slip of paper with the name of one of the 50 states from a container.
 - TSW design a stamp for the state they drw.
- TTW use the Google Slides presentation to review using the elements of art shape, line, color, and space to design a stamp.
 - TT and TSW discuss how these different elements fit into effectively designing a stamp.

Description

- TSW use their Chromebooks or the computer lab to research the state that they selected.
 - TTW post the following information on the board for the students to research:
 - 1. The state's landmarks
 - 2. The state's history
 - 3. Famous individuals from the state
 - 4. The state's geography
 - 5. Famous events that happen/happened in the state
 - 6. The state's flower
 - 7. The state's bird
- TSW design their stamp.













- As the students design their stamp, they will focus on the following things:
 - 1. What shape/size should my stamp be to better tell the story of the state (ex. Longer vs. shorter, square, rectangular, etc.)?
 - 2. How can I use lines to create the outline of my stamp?
 - 3. What colors should I include when designing my stamp?
 - 4. How should I use the space of my stamp?
 - How can I arrange the things I am drawing to draw attention to what is important?
 - 5. What words or other information should I include on my stamp (state mottos, stamp price, etc.)?
- When the students are done designing their stamps, TSW present their research and stamps to the class.
- TTW display the students' stamps in the classroom or hallway.

EXTENDED LEARNING ACTIVITIES

This lesson ties into social studies units on the fifty states.
